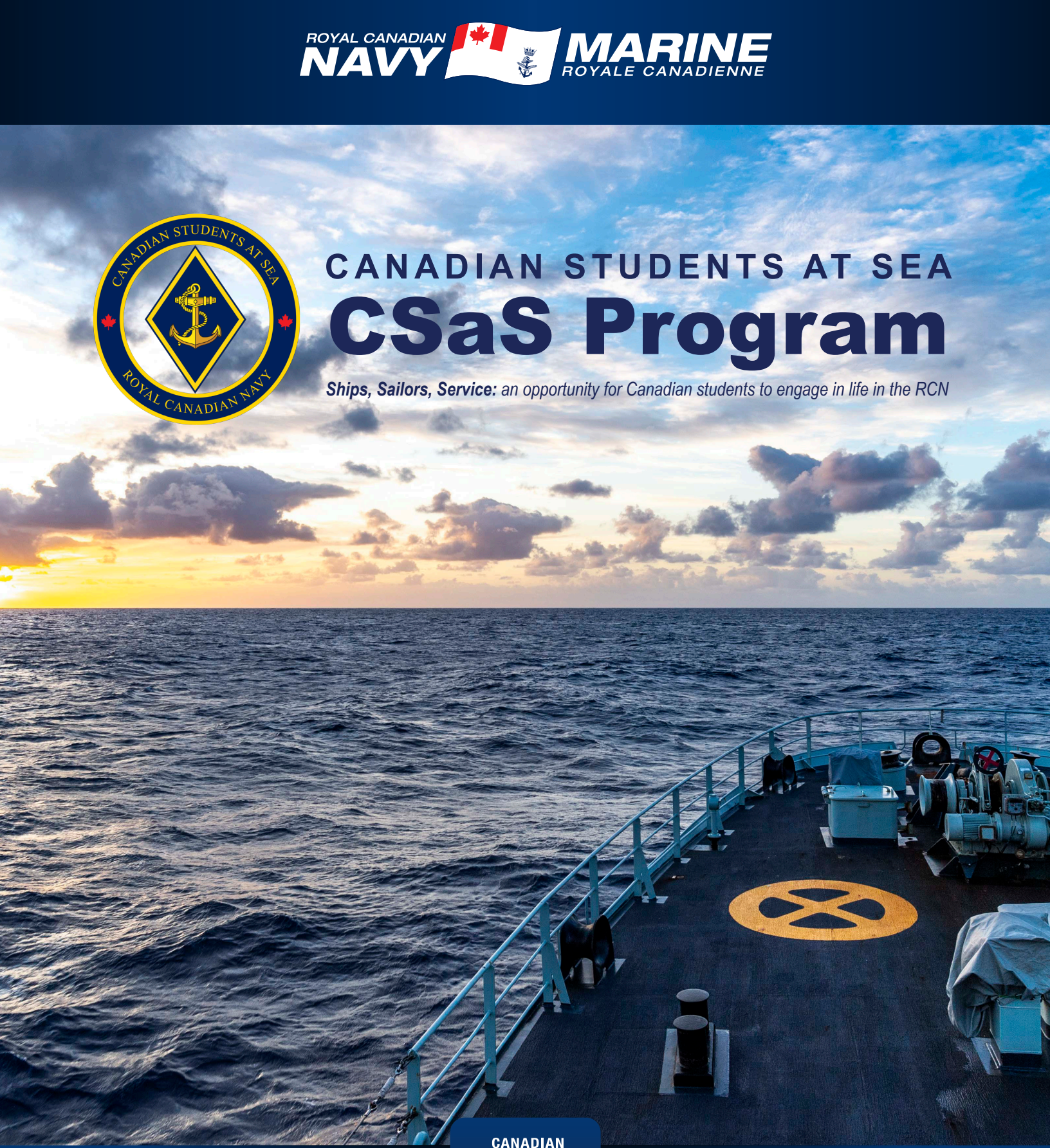

What is the CSaS program?

- The CSaS program provides a unique opportunity for Canadian students to engage in all aspects of life in the RCN
- Canadian students will gain an understanding of the RCN through a hands-on and fully immersive experience, both at-sea and ashore
- Duration: Daysail / Ashore briefs & tours

Why participate in the CSaS program?

- Discover your “all-ocean” global Navy
- An opportunity to visit Your Ships, Submarines and Naval Installations
- Interact with sailors and public servants to observe their skill, competence and commitment in the performance of their duties to protect Canada and defend Canadian interests around the world
- Learn about your RCN’s past, present and future service to Canada





Who participates in the CSaS program?

- The RCN invites Canadian secondary students (16yrs>) and post-secondary students who have interest in learning more about their all-ocean global Navy

When does the CSaS program run?

- CSaS programs are scheduled throughout the academic year, when ships and submarines sail for exercises and operations

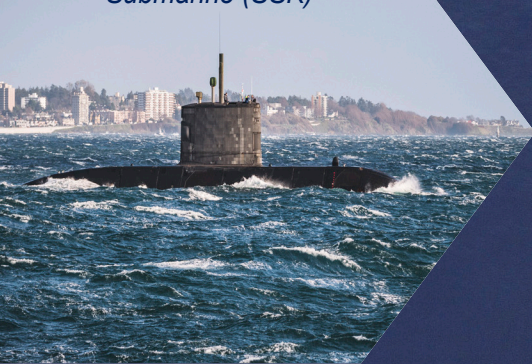
Where does the CSaS program take place?

- CSaS programs normally originate from Halifax, NS or Esquimalt, BC, but may be conducted in other locations, including internationally, depending on the ship's sailing schedule

What RCN vessels are used to conduct the CSaS program?



While at-sea and ashore, experiential elements may include the following:

- At sea:
 - Operations room
 - Bridge team
 - Weapons
 - Engineering
 - High-speed manoeuvring
 - Safety of life
 - Casualty clearance
 - Fire Fighting & Flood Control
 - Boat Operations
 - Flight Operations
 - Rules of Engagement
 - Other aspects of a warship's potential missions at sea
- Ashore:
 - Navy Presentation
 - Briefs and tours of:
 - » Naval Bases
 - » Fleet Diving Unit
 - » Damage Control Division
 - » Fleet Maintenance Facility
 - » Naval Fleet School
